

Reflections on the River

Weathering the Storm

Scripture — Mark 4:39-40

He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, 'Quiet! Be still!' Then the wind died down and it was completely calm.

Storms reveal where we place our trust long before they reveal our strength.

Every angler who spends enough time on the water eventually encounters unexpected weather. Blue skies can give way to dark clouds, rising wind, and distant thunder. The river reminds us that calm conditions are gifts, not guarantees.

The disciples knew that fear. Experienced fishermen suddenly found themselves overwhelmed by a storm they could not control. While they struggled, Jesus rested with complete confidence in His Father's care.

Many of life's storms arrive just as unexpectedly. Illness, disappointment, grief, broken relationships, and uncertainty can shake us. We often discover that faith is not the absence of fear but the decision to keep turning toward Christ in the middle of it.

Storms have a way of exposing what is firmly anchored. A tree with deep roots bends without breaking. A life rooted in God's promises can endure pressures that would otherwise overwhelm it.

Wise anglers know when to leave the water. Courage is not recklessness. Trusting God also means exercising wisdom, listening carefully, and respecting the power of creation.

Eventually every storm passes. Sometimes circumstances change quickly, and sometimes peace arrives long before the situation does. Christ's presence remains steady through both.

Reflection

Where have recent storms exposed both your fears and God's faithfulness?

Naturalist's Note

Mountain streams can rise rapidly during heavy rain, changing current speed and clarity within minutes. Respecting those conditions is part of safely enjoying wild places.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, when the winds rise around me, help me remember that You remain present and powerful. Anchor my heart in Your peace and guide my steps with wisdom. Amen.
